

Dick Cavicke gave a report on the August 2. 1987 club concourse.


Old Business: Randy read the Nabisco Cat response letter he received.

THE MICHELIN STORY

(CONTINUED)

The Michelins had posters printed and distributed around to promote the virtue of their products. Walking around the Lyons Fair in 1894 they spied a stack of tires. This stack was composed of different size tires, large ones in the middle and tapering with smaller ones at the top. Edouard said that if arms were added you would have a man. Four years later an artist did exactly that, thus the Michelin Man was born. In artist O'Galop's original sketch the Michelin Man was depicted as being at a pneumatic banquet offering a toast with a glass filled with nails, broken glass and sharp bits of metal. He was quoted as saying "Nunc est bibendum," meaning "Let's drink" or possibly loosely "See what I can drink." It was only natural that the Michelin Man soon became known as Bibendum.

The Michelins, ever on the alert to promote their products, and to encourage manufacturers to build more automobiles, had the first Red Guide printed. It contained road maps and was filled with advertisements. It was a promotional gimmick, was marked "Not for Sale" and was given free to chauffeurs. This first "Red Guide" contained 939 pages, was


printed on bible paper and was pocket size. It listed the French towns, their hotels and garages and a 58 page section called "Motoring 101" that covered every subject from pretty roads to boring ones and tire sizes, how to fix inner tubes and a list of gasoline depots. In that time most of the gasoline depots were not garages and service stations as we know them; they were far in the future. General stores and grocers were the usual sources for gasoline. There were symbols indicating whether or not the hotels sold gasoline and if they had a dark room for photographers. In 1901 the initials "WC" used as a symbol indicated that the hotel had a flush toilet. Recently while in Europe the author noted that the letters WC are still used in the hotels to indicate that the door so marked has a flush toilet concealed behind it.

The Red Guides are updated periodically and are still in print. For 1986 the guide to France has 1,279 pages and lists 4,586 localities with many city maps included. The Red Guides break even on an 85 franc price but the Green Guides to tourism and the 118 maps which Michelin

developed make a profit for the company. Gradually Michelin developed guides for other European countries and eventually for England. At the present time they are working on making the maps up to date with modern road conditions and are using more photos than line drawings to illustrate them. Mapping the United States is being thought of as a future project. Michelin is tight lipped about whether the publishing part of their business is profitable or not but in my opinion where Michelin maps are available, they are the ones to use.







On May 25th at the IMS Grand Prix held in Lime Rock (the oldest event of the IMSA circuit), a first turn spin (unusual) and a win (not unusual) were both provided by Al Holbert. He was driving their research and development car which is the oldest and winningest chassis and now sporting the race number 1. The Group 44 XJR-7 placed 5th after suffering a flat tire early on and later while running in 3rd place tried to pass a Fiero on the inside was struck when the driver moved to the inside instead of the outside. This caused a pitstop dropping the Jag to 5th. The final results were:

- Car 1, Al Holbert, Lowenbrau/Porsche 962.
- Car , Scott Pruett/Pete Halsmer, Ford Mustang GTP.
- 3. Car , Price Cobb/James Weaver, Porsche 962.
- 4. Car , Whitney Ganz/Bob Lobenberg, Buick-Hawk.
- 5. Car 44, Hurley Haywood/John Morton, Jaguar XJR-7.

•••The TWR Jaguar XJR-8 team will replace Group 44 on the IMSA circuit from 1988 to 1991. Their cars were running 2nd and 3rd at LeMans at the halfway mark (12 hours), but were eliminated when one crashed and the other had mechanical problems. See related article, "The Big Cats are Back" in the next issue.

Now that Bob Tullius' Group 44 has been replaced by Tom Walkinshaw, Bob is planning a full Indycar schedule with Chip Robinson his probable driver.

LAST-MINUTE RACE NEWS. The date is 21 June and we have to go to press tomorrow morning. Group 44 has just given me a very good Fathers' Day present (along with all the other people) with a 1st place win in the three-hour enduro Grand Prix at West Palm Beach. The Jag driven by Hurley Haywood and John Morton, very quietly moved up positions in the race until they were running in 2nd. When Bob Wollek brushed a wall, they moved into 1st. Chip Robinson in the Holbert Porsche was 2nd by about 3.5 seconds. Chip managed to pass Hurley in traffic on a turn and took the lead. With 3 laps to go (sound familiar), Chip tried to pass a slower car on the outside (happened to be A.J. Foyt) and Hurley took the inside track and came out in 1st place. This proved to be the winning move, as the big cat pulled away to win by about 10 car lengths. All this happened with about 3 minutes to go in the three-hour race. Hurley Haywood was driving the last portion of the race, his last in this car and again I wish to congratulate him on not only this, but all of his past performances with Group 44. Bob Tullius will be on the track in Watkins Glen, July 5th, for the last race of Group 44 XJR-7 car 44. The Group 44 pit crew received the award for best pit work, even before the race was over. Many kudos to all of you people associated with the effort. You have provided us with many happy hours of cheering for Group 44 and Jaguar over the years.

FLASHBACKS

•••Cars 44 and 04 were entered in the Le Mans France 24-hour endurance race in June 1984. Jaguars have won 5 times at Le Mans. What year did Jaguar first enter the Le Mans competition?

The year was 1950 when the works (factory) Jaguar XK120 (near standard) started at Le Mans with Leslie Johnson driving. The car was running in third place, with many outright racing cars trailing, when failing brakes led to an overstrained clutch and eventual retirement. Howzat!

DEAD BATTERY? NO PROBLEM, RIGHT? WRONG!

Every Jaguar has a dead battery at one time or another. Jump-starting is one of things that just come naturally. It's part'n parcel of that general body of knowledge that comes with owning a car.


"Red to positive and black to negative;" It's so simple. How can you miss. Well, 25,000 people missed last year. That's how many suffered eye injuries from explosions that occurred when they jump-started their cars.

Hydrogen gas (which kept the Hendenberg aloft) is highly explosive. It is produced by your car battery even though it's sealed, it escapes through vents. It can be ignited by an electrical spark, the explosion could send sulphuric acid into your eyes.

However, you can jump-start safely using the following guidelines.

- 1. Both batteries same voltage.
- 2. Keep flames and cigarettes away.
- 3. Connect cables before starting either car.
- 4. Positive of good battery to positive of dead battery. Then connect negative of good battery to a spot on the engine block as far from dead battery as possible.
- 5. Don't lean over engine while cranking.
- 6. Wear safety goggles.


